William Lloyd Garrison

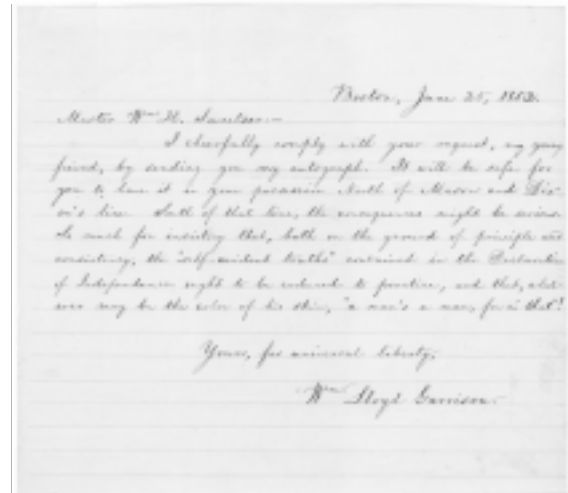

Hated by pro-slavery factions, both in the North and South for his outspoken and very public opposition to “the curse – SLAVERY”. Garrison’s undying and selfless work for the cause of freedom for **all** Americans is both sympathetically and angrily displayed in this sentiment to an admirer in 1852.

While many around the divided nation were vehemently opposed to slavery, few were as outspoken and fearless of the personal risk and consequences of his opinions as was William Lloyd Garrison. Born into a family of modest means, his rise to the pinnacle of the American reform movement is a story of legend. Garrison’s outspoken stand in favor of immediate freedom for slaves made him and his newspaper *The Liberator* unpopular with pro-slavery forces both North and South.

A man with the courage of his convictions and the commitment to a variety of causes within the reform movement, his work towards the abolition of slavery made him one of the most controversial figures of the period - and one of the most beloved Civil Rights leaders in our nation’s history. Archibald Grimke said of him, “Garrison, more than any other man, embodied the moral forces of the conflict, the story of his life being essentially the history of the moral uprising against Slavery.”



“So much for insisting that, both on the ground of principle and consistency, the 'self-evident truths' contained in the Declaration of Independence ought to be reduced to practice, and that, whatever may be the color of his skin, 'a man's a man for a' that!"

A rare and desirable caricature of **Winston Churchill** made from life by world famous Czechoslovakian caricaturist Oscar Berger. Signed Sketch. 8 1/2" x 10 1/4".

The Right Honourable Sir Winston Leonard Spencer Churchill (1874-1965), British statesman, orator, and author who as prime minister (1940-45, 1951-55) rallied the British people during World War II and led his country from the brink of defeat to victory. This great caricature of Churchill shows the large cigar and top hat he was famous for. While drawing this caricature Berger compiled a few notes regarding Churchill *"...Of all my air -raid sketches, the most appropriate is that of Winston Churchill, done in 1940, when Churchill's leadership was a common symbol of hope.*



As the ancient houses of parliament shook under the bursting bombs, I saw his heavy jowl fill with determination. Churchill never winced, but seemed to gather new strength as he spoke. WILLS, HENRY FORDS EARLY PARTNER**

DUESENBERG, FRED S. (1876-1932). Automotive engineer and manufacturer. Since the turn of the century, Fred Duesenberg had been well known as a designer of fast, powerful, reliable gasoline engines which came to be widely used in the marine, automotive and aviation industries. TLS. 1 page. 8" x 10". Indianapolis, Indiana. On imprinted Duesenberg company letterhead to C. Harold Wills, Henry Ford's partner in Ford Motor Company. Duesenberg writes to Wills concerning his interest in potentially hiring the current sales manager of Stutz Motor Company and asks for the latter's thoughts on the subject. *"I understand that Douglas Andrews was with your company for sometime as sales manager. He has been recommended to us highly as a man that would be of considerable help in sales and finances."*
"I do not know whether he is available at the present time, as he is now sales manager for the Stutz Company, but before I approach him on the subject I would like to have a letter from you telling me what you can about him and his ability along these lines."

A nice association of these two Automotive giants and interesting to see Duesenberg in the midst of attempting to steal a competitor's key employee. Boldly signed at the conclusion. Folds. Couple of minor pin holes in upper left corner. Otherwise, excellent. **\$2,250**



**A SCARCE DOCUMENT SIGNED
BY WALT DISNEY AND
HIS WIFE LILLIAN**

DISNEY, WALTER E. "WALT". (1901-1966). World-renowned Cartoonist and Movie Producer; Entertainment and Theme Park pioneer. Almost certainly the best known cartoonist and movie producer in history. DS. 1 page. 8 1/2" x 6". Milwaukee, October 7, 1957. Partly-printed promissory note indicating that Disney and his wife had borrowed \$51,000 from First Wisconsin National Bank of Milwaukee. Disney's address is listed as Burbank, California. The note is signed by both Walt Disney and his wife Lillian and thus offers a nice association of the two. Paid stamp not affecting any signatures. Couple of file holes at top. Accompanied by a letter from the bank indicating the note was renewed. In Fine condition. **\$2,500**

**FOUR LANGUAGE SHIPS PASSPORT FOR A
NEW BEDFORD WHALER SIGNED BY
MILLARD FILLMORE AND DANIEL WEBSTER**

FILLMORE, MILLARD (1800 - 1874). Thirteenth President of the United States. Document Signed. 22" x 16". New Bedford, Massachusetts. June 28, 1852. Partly-printed four language ships pass for a Whaler the "Tahmaroo" captained by George F. Neil which sailed from Fairhaven Massachusetts on June 29, 1852 returning from its voyage on April 6, 1856. Records indicate the vessel sent home 1,172 barrels of whale oil, 120 sperm whales and 11,000 bone. Printed in English, Spanish, French and Dutch. Countersigned by Daniel Webster as Secretary of State. A nice whaling ship's pass. Couple of small holes at the fold intersections. Fine but for the small holes. **\$1,750**

**A SCARCE DOCUMENT SIGNED BY WILLIAM
HENRY HARRISON AND HIS WIFE ANNA**

HARRISON, WILLIAM HENRY. (1773-1841). Ninth President and hero of Tippecanoe in the War of 1812. He was Governor of the Indiana Territory, a Congressman, and Senator before his election as President in 1840. He delivered a two hour Inaugural Address and became sick; he died just thirty-one days later, allowing John Tyler to become the first Vice President to ascent to the Presidency. DS. 12 1/2" X 15 3/4". 1 page. June 11, 1827. The future president and his wife sell land lying along the Ohio River to a Nicholas Longworth and other individuals. Anna is a bit scarce in her own right and this combination of the future President and First Lady on a single document is seldom seen and rather exceptional. **\$2,950**

**GOVERNOR FITZHUGH LEE WRITES TO A
CONSTITUENT CONCERNING THE STATUS OF FUND
RAISING FOR A STATUE OF ROBERT E. LEE**

LEE, FITZHUGH. (1835-1905). Confederate general during the Civil War; Governor; Diplomat. A nephew of Robert E. Lee, Lee's outstanding service to the Confederacy during the Civil War has ranked him among the top dozen cavalry officers born in America. After the War, he was governor of Virginia (1886-1890), and consul-general in Havana 1896-1898. The tact and firmness he displayed in the events leading up to the Spanish-American War made him a national figure and, after the Spanish-American War, he was made military governor of Havana. Typed Letter Signed. 1 page. 7 1/2" x 10". Richmond, Virginia. On imprinted Governor's Office stationery to Miss Nannie P. Horsley concerning the Robert E. Lee memorial statue, *"I have duly received your note, and in reply I regret to say that we have not quite money enough yet for the 'Lee' statue. We hope to unveil it with appropriate ceremonies, early in December next."* Accompanied by original envelope. In excellent condition. **\$295**

**CONFEDERATE OATH OF ALLEGIANCE WITNESSED
BY ABRAM JOSEPH WALKER, CHIEF JUSTICE OF THE
ALABAMA SUPREME COURT**

WALKER, ABRAM JOSEPH (1819 - 1872). Chief Justice of the Alabama Supreme Court. 1862, Montgomery County, Alabama. Partly-printed document in which "Thomas Hennessy, do solemnly swear that I will bear true allegiance to, observe and support the Constitution of the Confederate States of America, and that I will serve them honestly and faithfully against all their enemies or opposers whatsoever." Witnessed by Walker at the conclusion. A scarce Confederate Oath. Very Fine. **\$245**

A NICE DISRAELI SIGNATURE

DISRAELI, BENJAMIN (1804 - 1881). The only Jewish Prime Minister of Great Britain. Signature cut from the conclusion of a letter, *"I remain, Sir, your faithful servant. B. Disraeli. Jan. 15, 1863"*. One fold. Fine. **\$195**

**THE ONLY WOMAN SELECTED BY THE SONS OF
CONFEDERATE VETERANS TO RECEIVE THE
CONFEDERATE MEDAL OF HONOR**

HOPKINS, JULIET ANN OPIE (1818 - 1890). An ardent supporter of the Confederate cause. DS. April, 1862. 1 page. Partly-printed bank check drawn on Cashier of the Bank of Virginia. Hopkins instructs the Cashier to pay "Twenty-five dollars" to bearer. Signed at conclusion Mrs. A. F. Hopkins. A seldom seen autograph for the Civil War or Woman's History collection. **\$275**

**COLONIAL GOVERNOR LORD CORNBURY GRANTS
A RARE AUTHORITY TO A WOMAN TO ADMINISTER
HER LATE HUSBAND'S ESTATE**

CORBURY, EDWARD HYDE-LORD. (1661-1723). Colonial Governor of New York and New Jersey. Well known as a transvestite, his outrageous behavior for the period, arrogance and dishonesty led to his being recalled to England. Document Signed. 7 3/4" x 5 1/2". 1 page. New York. March 24, 1707/08. Cornbury grants a rare authority for a woman to administer her husband's estate. "Sarah Swan, the widow and relief of () Swan late of the County of Richmond dec'd praying administration on the Estate of her said husband dec'd I do direct the same to be granted accordingly." Boldly signed "Cornbury" at the conclusion. Three folds. In excellent condition. **\$950**

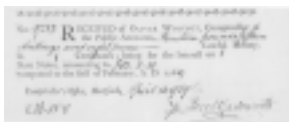
FRANCIS HOPKINSON ORDERS THE ARREST OF A MAN HELD IN CONTEMPT FOR FAILURE TO PAY A JUDGEMENT AGAINST HIM

HOPKINSON, FRANCIS (1737-1791). Signer of the Declaration of Independence from New Jersey. Hopkinson represented New Jersey in the Continental Congress thereby signing the Declaration. He served in his capacity as treasurer of loans from July 1778 to July 1781, a particularly difficult period of financing for the newly formed nation. In 1779, he was appointed to succeed Ross as the judge of the admiralty court of Pennsylvania, an office that he held for ten years until the organization of the federal government. Soon after the adoption of the federal constitution, Washington appointed Hopkinson to the office of Judge of the United States, for the district of Pennsylvania. This was an important and dignified position that he was well qualified and suited for, giving stability and dignity to the new national government. It is during this period that Hopkinson has signed this document. During his judicial career Hopkinson conscientiously avoided mingling in politics.

Document Signed. 1 page. 13" x 8". Philadelphia, July 8, 1786. Hopkinson orders the arrest of a Philadelphia merchant, John Schaffer who "was cited and warned to bring the said monies into court which in contempt of this Honorable Court he hath neglected and omitted to do..." A judgement against Schaffer had been previously been determined by the court and remained unpaid. A nice document signed during an important period of his legal career. Tipped along edges to a paper border done by Anderson galleries in the 1920's. Couple of folds. Very Fine. **\$950**

ANDREW JOHNSON APPOINTS A RESERVE CORPS VETERAN

JOHNSON, ANDREW (1808-1875). Seventeenth President of the United States; Only President to be both impeached and tried. Document Signed. 16" x 20" 1 page. Washington, D.C., May 7, 1865. A fine large engraved spread-eagle at top, flags and military equipment at bottom. Partly-printed appointment of George J. Cook as "First Lieutenant in the Veteran Reserve Corps in the service of the United States..." Countersigned by Edward M. Stanton as Secretary of War. Folds. Extremely Fine. Signed by Johnson just a few weeks after assuming the presidency following Lincoln's assassination. A nice example for display. **\$1,450**



A FINE JEREMIAH WADSWORTH SIGNED TREASURY RECEIPT FOR STATE NOTES

WADSWORTH, JEREMIAH (1743-1804). Army officer; Member of the U.S. House of Representatives; Business executive. A successful merchant, Wadsworth was appointed to a number of commissary-general posts beginning in 1775. He served as the commissary-general of the Continental Army, 1778-79, during which time Washington wrote that, thanks to Wadsworth, "supplies had been good and ample." At the request of Rochambeau, Wadsworth served as commissary-general for the French troops until the close of the war. After the war, Wadsworth helped found, or was a director of, organizations such as the Bank of North America in Philadelphia, the United States Bank, and the Bank of New York.

Hartford, Connecticut. April 13, 1789. Document signed. 1 page. 7 1/2" x 3". Partly-printed receipt for "Oliver Wolcott, Comptroller of the Public Accounts, fourteen pounds, fifteen shillings and eight pence Lawful Money, in 1 Certificate; being for the Interest on 1 State Note..." Boldly Signed by Jeremiah Wadsworth at the conclusion. In excellent condition. **\$450**



A ONE HUNDRED YEN BANK NOTE SIGNED BY HIDEKI TOJO WHILE IN PRISON

TOJO, HIDEKI (1884 - 1948). The Japanese premier who led Japan into war with America. He was convicted as a war criminal and hanged. DS. 1 page. 6 1/2" x 3 3/4". [circa 1945 - 1948]. A Japanese one hundred yen bank note signed "Hideki Tojo" in English. He signed in blue ink for one of his American jailers, from whom we obtained this piece. A rare and desirable item. **\$1,250**

Lockheed Aircraft Stock Signed by Founder Allan Loughead



Founded in 1926 by Allan Loughead and his brother Malcolm, the company was bought by Detroit Aircraft Corporation in 1929, only to have the parent corporation file for bankruptcy in 1932. During that same year, bankers Robert and Courtland Gross bought Lockheed's assets and revived the company's business with the Electra, a twin-engined all metal airliner. The advent of World War II began the company's business as a defense contractor by beginning with the P-38 Lightning bomber and continues as a primary contractor for U.S. defense aircraft as Lockheed Martin Corporation.

Allan Loughead (1889 - 1969) legally changed his last name to Lockheed in order that its spelling would match its pronunciation. He worked throughout World War II in aircraft design and development. Once when asked what he did during the early days of aviation, an elderly Lockheed responded "I survived".

1864, Connecticut. Stock certificate for 100 shares. Black. Top center vignette of State of Connecticut Seal. Attached blue fifty-cent George Washington revenue stamp at lower left. This company manufactured Derringers during the Civil War. A rare gun stock. Uncancelled and Extremely Fine. **\$950**



500 POUNDS STERLING ERLANGER BOND SIGNED BY JOHN SLIDELL

CRISWELL #118. June 1, 1863. 500 pounds sterling/12,500 francs/20,000 pounds of cotton. Black with olive coupons. Engraved vignette of Liberty holding the Confederate "Stars and Bars" and gazing out to sea. Signed by **JOHN SLIDELL** (1793 - 1871); Confederate diplomat from Louisiana; U.S. Representative and Senator. This bond was a "secured loan convertible on demand by the holder into cotton at 6 pence the pound when cotton in Europe was 24 pence the pound" (*Financial Failure and Confederate Defeat* by Douglas B. Ball). It is also signed by Franco-German financier Emil Erlanger. These "Cotton Loan" bonds are among the highest quality printed debt issue of the Confederacy. Partial coupons attached at left and right. Some aging. Light bleed-through from writing on verso. Uncancelled and fine. **\$575**



A RARE EARLY PENNSYLVANIA WINE STOCK

1811, Philadelphia. Stock certificate for "one share in the Company for promoting the Cultivation of Vines in Pennsylvania for which he has paid Twenty Dollars in full." The embossed company seal depicts a bunch of grapes encircled by the company name and the incorporation date of 1802. A rare, very early American wine stock with a nice, ornate border. **\$750**



A RARELY SEEN RAILROAD BOND ISSUED TO AND SIGNED ON THE ACCOMPANYING TRANSFER DOCUMENT BY THOMAS EDISON

1890, Indiana. \$10,000 bond of the Cincinnati, Indianapolis, St. Louis and Chicago Railway Company issued to and signed on the accompanying irrevocable bond power by **THOMAS A. EDISON** (1847-1931). Edison was one of the most important and prolific inventors in history. By age 22, Edison had sold his first patent, the stock-ticker, which was immediately used. He was able to work for days on end with little rest, and his rare combination of inventive genius and business acumen allowed not only inventive, but also commercial success. He invented over 1,000 pieces and his best known ones are the light bulb, phonograph, storage battery and film projector. Edison is rarely seen investing in companies which were not his own and this is one of only a very few we are aware of. Edison transfers the bond to a Frank R. Wright on June 18, 1894. A highly attractive bond which would display nicely with the signed transfer adjacent to the bond. The bond has a few punch cancellations while the document and Edison's bold signature remain free from cancellation. **\$2,750**



YELLOWSTONE PARK TRANSPORTATION CO.

Unissued stock certificate. Yellow and black vignette of traveling stagecoach at center. By Act of Congress on March 1, 1872, Yellowstone National Park was "dedicated and set apart as a public park or pleasuring ground for the benefit and enjoyment of the people" and "for the preservation, from injury or spoilation, of all timber, mineral deposits, natural curiosities, or wonders. . . and their retention in their natural condition." Yellowstone is the first and oldest national park in the world.

An unusual design and fantastic topic. Uncancelled and Excellent condition. **\$245**



COCHECO MINING COMPANY

1859, Tennessee. Stock certificate for 14,013 shares. Black. Vignette of seated liberty and shield with waterfalls in the background at center, mining shaft and miners at work at left. Litho. A scarce, early Tennessee mining stock. Uncancelled and Extremely Fine. **\$345**



THE GREYHOUND CORPORATION

1872, Delaware. \$1,000 bond bearing 6 1/2% interest. Blue/Black. Large vignette of a springing greyhound at top center. Litho. A very displayable certificate from well-known bus line. Lightly punch cancelled and Extremely Fine. **\$29**



RARE STOCK CERTIFICATE SIGNED BY JOSHUA CHAMBERLAIN

1889, New Jersey. Stock certificate for 100 shares. Green/Black. Engraved vignette of surveyors at work at top center, New Jersey state seal below. Signed as president of the company by **JOSHUA L. CHAMBERLAIN** (1828 - 1914). Union general during the Civil War. Received the Congressional Medal of Honor for his defense of Little Round Top (while still a colonel) during the Battle of Gettysburg. Later the Governor of Maine and President of Bowdoin College. Certificates signed by Chamberlain have been extremely difficult to obtain within the market.

A fine rarity for any collection. A highly ornate certificate great for display and a truly fine addition to an autograph, certificate or Civil War related collection. **\$1,950**



STOCK CERTIFICATE SIGNED BY CONFEDERATE GENERAL JAMES LONGSTREET

1871, Louisiana. Stock certificate for 5 shares of the New Orleans & North Eastern Rail Road Company. Black with a light purple background printing. Engraved vignette of a steam locomotive at top center, female at left. Signed as president of the company by **JAMES LONGSTREET** (1821 - 1904). Confederate general during the Civil War, upon Stonewall Jackson's death he became Robert E. Lee's ablest Lieutenant and highly trusted advisor. Advised Lee against the disastrous "Pickett's Charge" at Gettysburg. A scarce certificate of which just a small quantity of less than 20 surfaced. 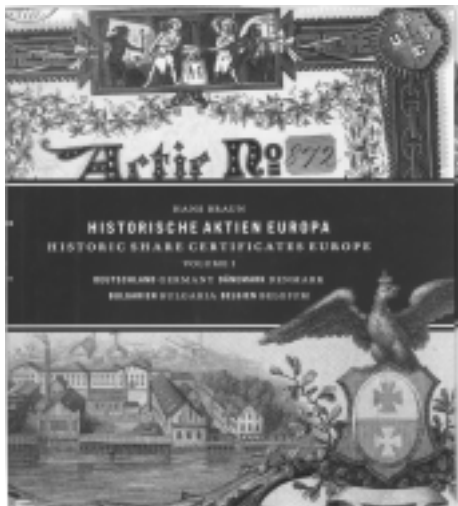
